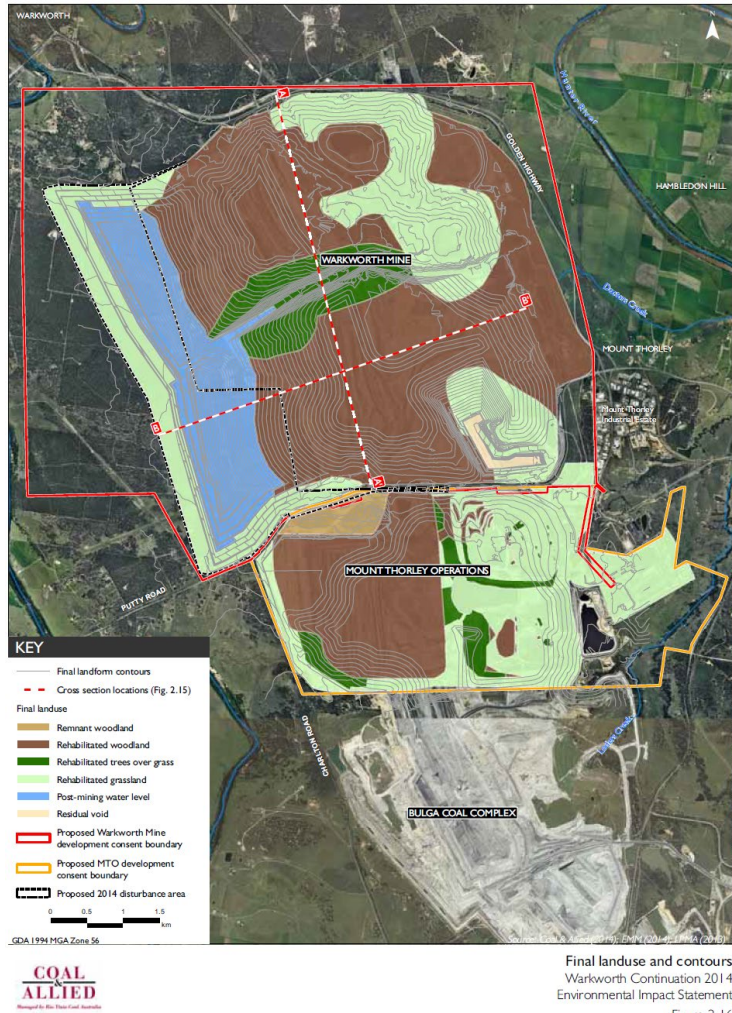

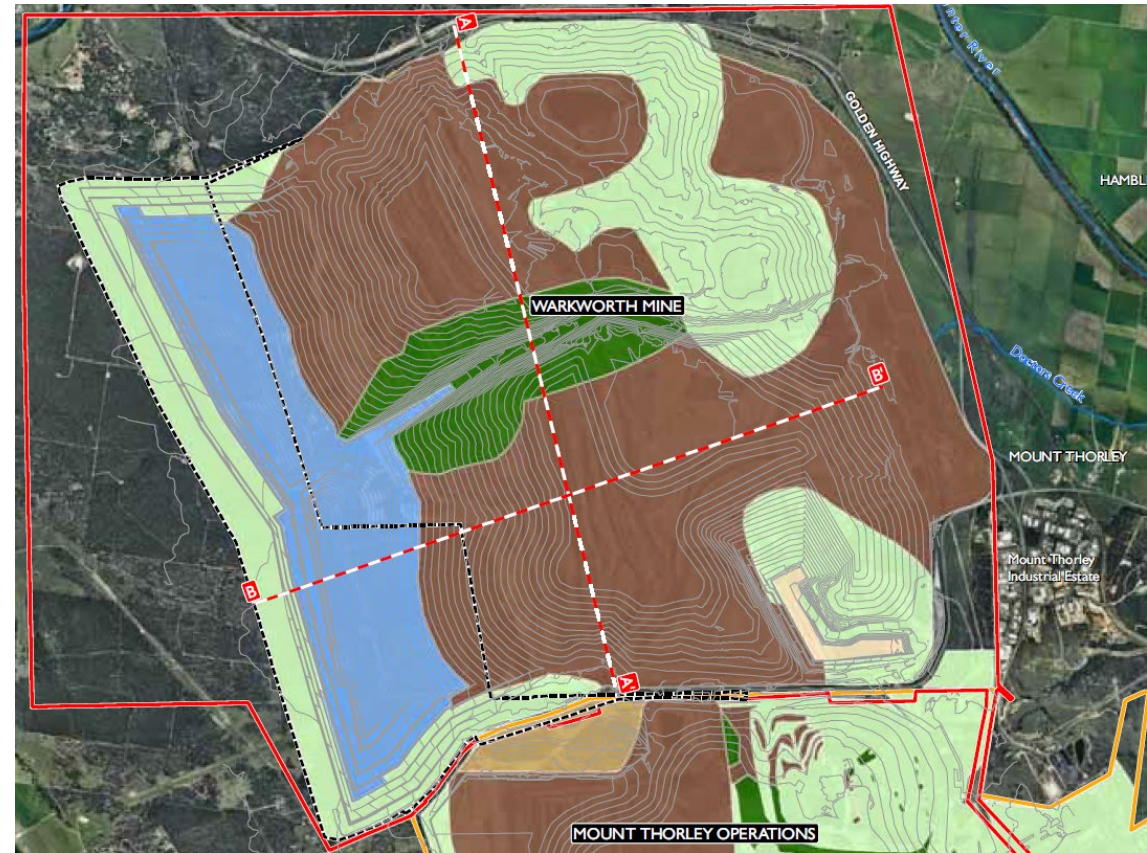

Void Not Filled for potential UG access

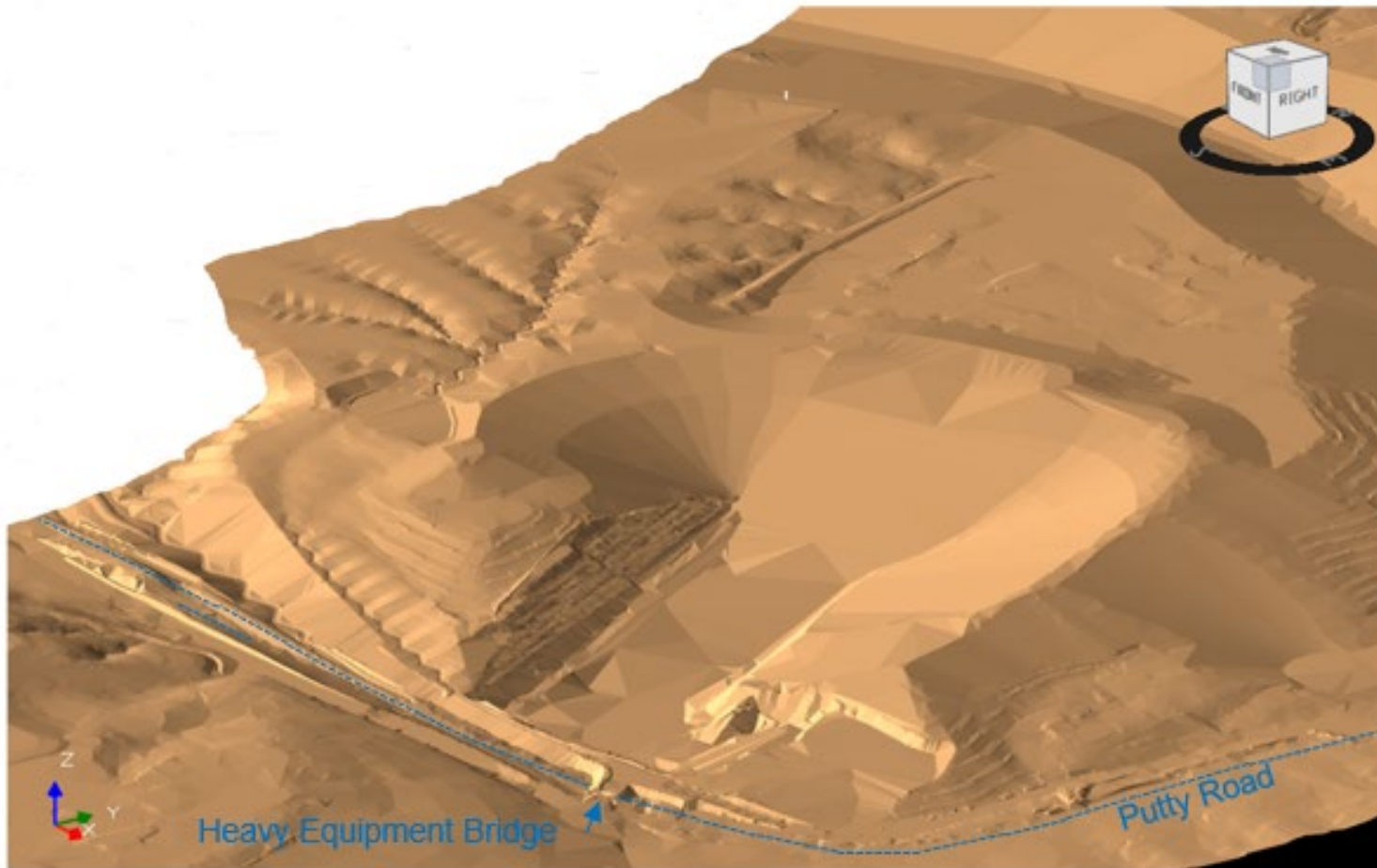


Final landuse and contours

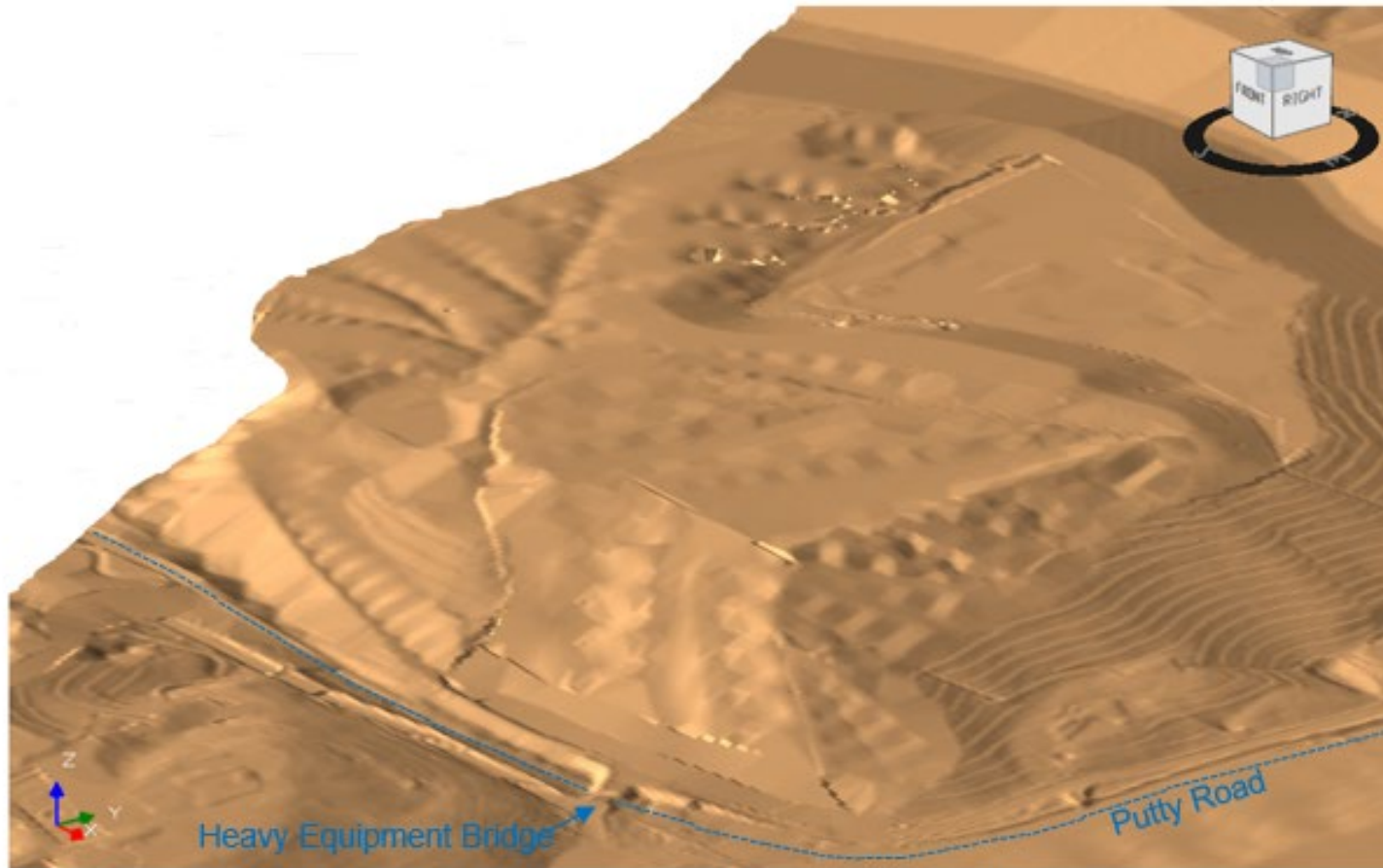


From the 2014 EIS – “If the South Pit open void is not required for underground mining access, it would be used for emplacement of overburden and / or tailings”.

Proposed MOP Landform - South Pit Void Filled

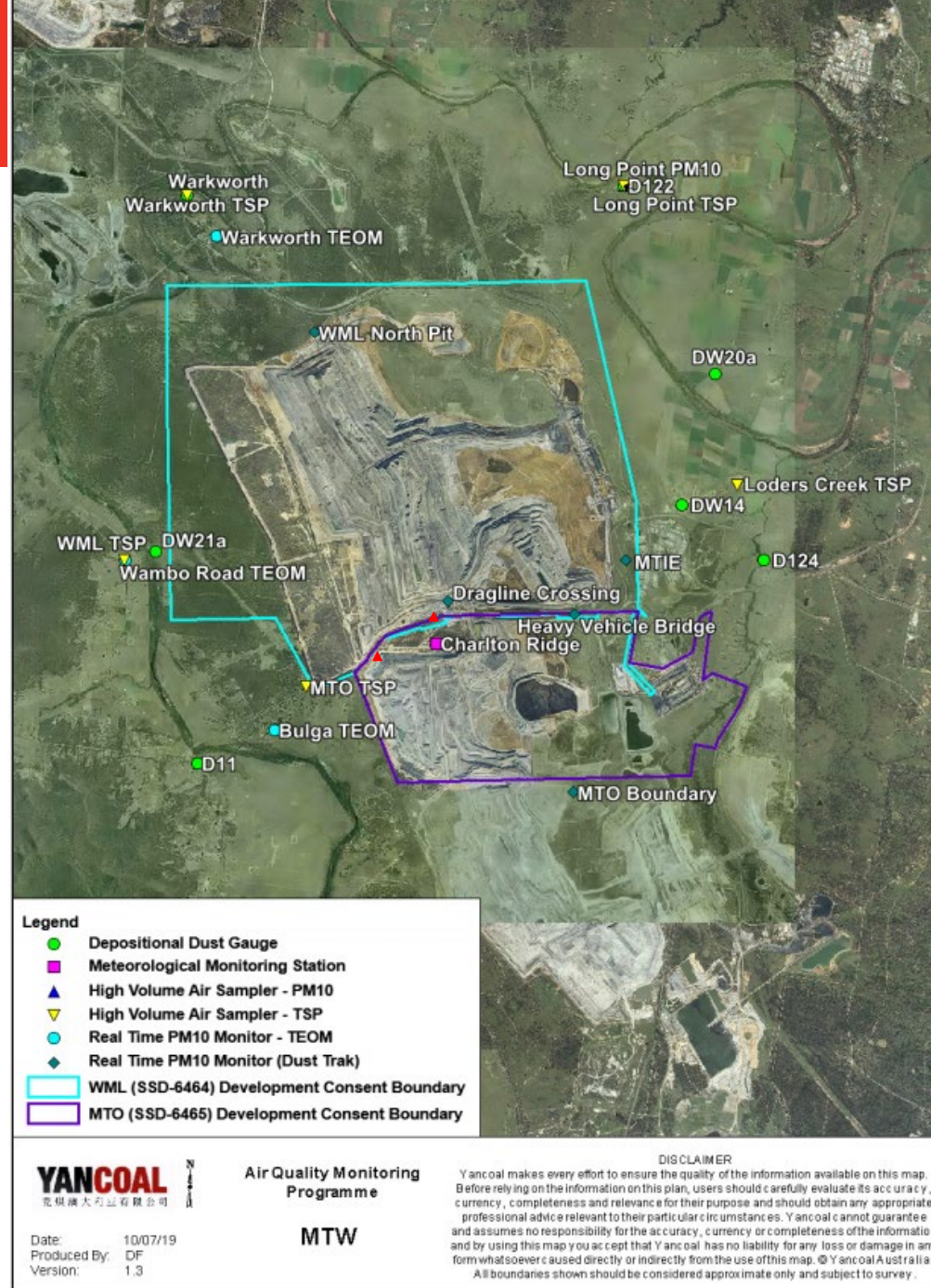

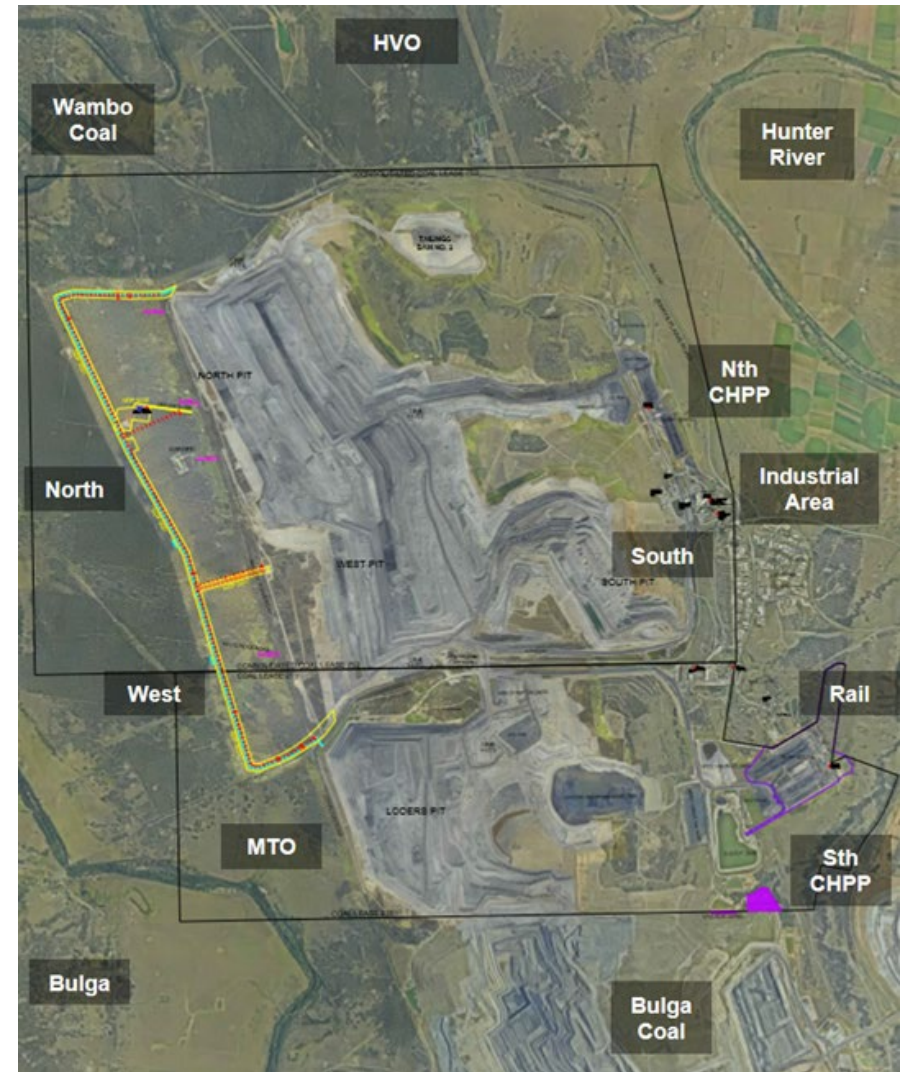
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MTW Operations

- Mining production continued in Warkworth and Mount Thorley Operations.
- MTO: Dragline 102 continued to operate in Loders Pit South and is progressing through its final strip. The last major MTO blast occurred in August 2020, a couple of minor blasts remain.
- MTO: Loders Pit drainage filter bed will be constructed Q3-Q4 2020, part of Loders Pit becoming waste / tailings emplacement. Import of ballast rock via MTO (Ave 60-75 trucks/day shift)
- WML: DL103 has been working in the lower passes of West Pit and North Pit.
- WML: DL101 (parked up Feb 2020) planning for its return to work in September 2020.
- WML: Water management ahead of mining (sediment basins / catch drains) will be constructed Q3-Q4 2020.
- Coal processing and train loading normal operations.



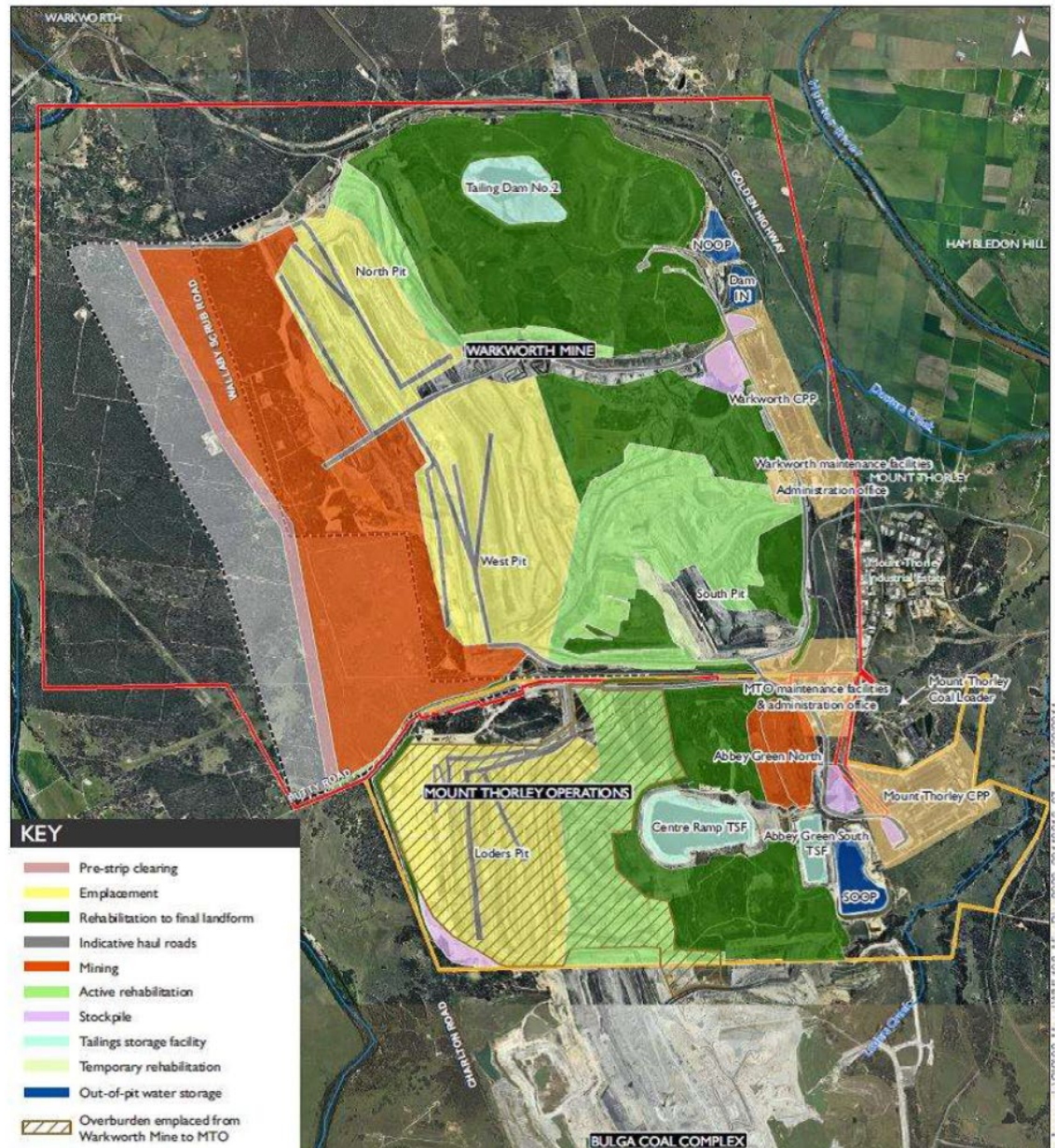
Exploration

- Some exploration activities visible from the road



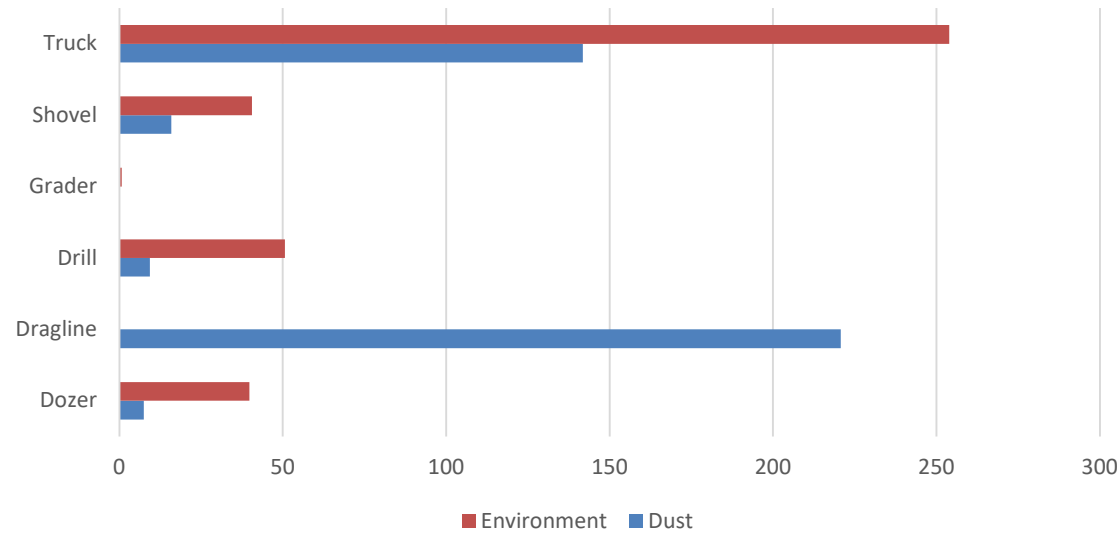
MTW Operations – NOOP Dam

- NOOP is an approved dam in Warkworth Continuation Project development consent SSD-6464 and will provide improved water security / balance position at MTW.
- Infrastructure and test blasting initially completed in 2019. Some facilitating infrastructure and preparation will continue in 2020.
- North Out Of Pit (NOOP) main dam construction has been postponed to 2022.

MTW Operations – Rehabilitation/ Disturbance 2020

Rehabilitation reforecast for 2020 - 44Ha seeded (shown in red).

- Progress to end of July:
 - Shaped = 27.2ha
 - Ready to Seed = 15.4ha
- Key works for Quarter 3 2020 (Jul-Sep)
 - Bulk shaping in NPN
 - Topsoiling and composting in MTO, CD Dump and NPN
 - Seeding of new rehab in MTO, CD Dump and NPN
 - Stage 2 seeding (part of 2020 program for 69 Ha to final seed mix on historic cover crop areas)

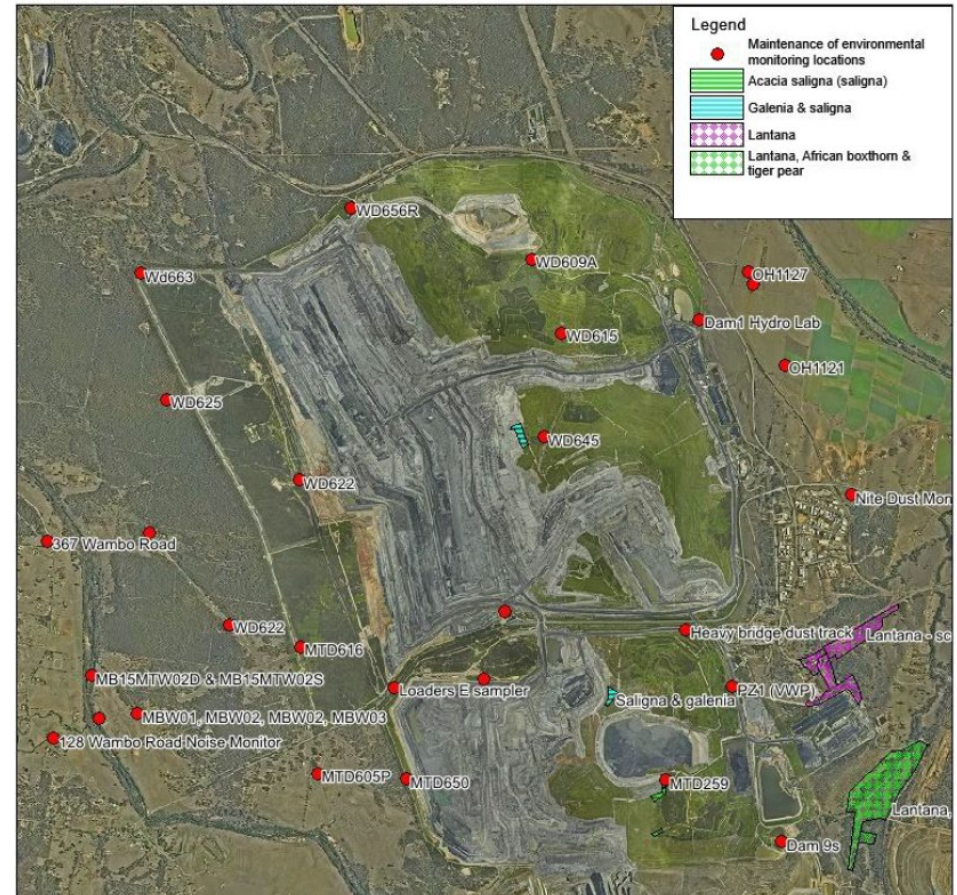
MTW Weed Management Q2 2020

Weeds targeted in MTW operational areas Q2 2020 included:

- African boxthorn (*Lycium ferocissimum*)
- Castor Oil (*Ricinus communis*)
- Galenia (*Galenia pubescens*)
- Green cestrum (*Cestrum parqui*)
- Lantana (*Lantana Camara*)
- Opuntia (Pear) species (Tiger, Prickly and Creeping Pear)
- Saligna (*Acacia saligna*)

- Galenia (*Galenia pubescens*)
- Lantana (*Lantana camara*)
- Green Cestrum (*Cestrum parqui*)
- African Boxthorn (*Lycium ferocissimum*)
- African Olive (*Olea europaea* subsp. *cuspidata*)
- Blue Heliotrope (*Heliotropium amplexicaule*)
- Bidens (*Bidens pilosa*)
- Telegraph Weed (*Heterotheca grandiflora*)
- Mother of Millions (*Bryophyllum delagonesse*)
- Coolatai Grass (*Cynodon dactylon*)

Pads of Prickly Pear infected with the cochineal insect (*Dactylopius opuntiae*) were introduced to a sheltered area of NBA1 in late March.

MTW BA Planting Program 2020

2020 planting program

Northern BA - Warkworth Sands Woodland planting progress:

- track maintenance completed;
- a total of 9,112m³ of WSW sand has been stripped at MTW and hauled to the Northern Biodiversity Area;
- 5,480m³ of this has been spread into strips and seeded with native grasses to increase the groundcover diversity;
- these strips have been planted with Warkworth Sands Woodland tube stock in August 2020; and
- the additional 3,632m³ will be spread into strips and seeded with native grass this year with tube stock planting scheduled for 2021.

Southern BA - Infill planting of Warkworth Sands Woodland and central Hunter Grey Box – Ironbark Woodland will continue.

Gouldburn River BA - Infill planting of 21.5ha of Yellow Box – Grey Box – Red Gum grassy woodland and 24.2ha of River Oak riparian woodland will continue.

- Weed control is underway in the infill planting areas
- Tube stock has been propagated and will be planted in August – September 2020.



MTW Vertebrate Pest Management 2020

The 2020 vertebrate pest programs have been coordinated with LLS and other large landholders in the area so all programs are undertaken at the same time across the broader Hunter Valley areas.

The following programs have been completed:

- 1080 baiting targeting wild dogs and foxes: May
- Wild dog trapping: following 1080 baiting in May
- 1080 feral pig baiting and rabbit baiting: June (13 feral pigs poisoned)

The following programs have been scheduled for Q3 & Q4:

- Noisy Miner control Goulburn River Biodiversity Area: August
- 1080 baiting targeting wild dogs and foxes: week commencing 12 October 2020
- Feral cat trapping as required
- Opportunistic shooting as required
- Commercial Kangaroo Harvesting

Regent Honeyeaters on the Biodiversity Areas

Regent Honeyeaters are listed as critically endangered with approximately 400 individuals remaining in the wild.

The MTW Biodiversity Areas protect and manage habitat for the Regent Honeyeater to feed and potentially breed in.

Noisy Miner Control in the GRBA

The Noisy Miner bird control program at the **Goulburn River Biodiversity Area** has been reducing the impacts of aggressive competition on Regent Honeyeater habitat with a marked reduction in Noisy Miners over the last few years. Regent Honeyeaters have been recorded and have had some successful breeding periods at this Biodiversity Area over the last few years.

The August 2020 program resulted in 197 Noisy Miners being removed from across the landscape and the recording of a single male Regent Honeyeater entering the Biodiversity Area after the program.

2020 Biodiversity Area Bird Monitoring

The 2020 bird monitoring program which is currently being undertaken has also recorded one female and two male Regent Honeyeaters at the **Putty Biodiversity Area** (See image adjacent). **This is the first time Regent Honeyeaters have been recorded at the Putty Biodiversity Area!!**

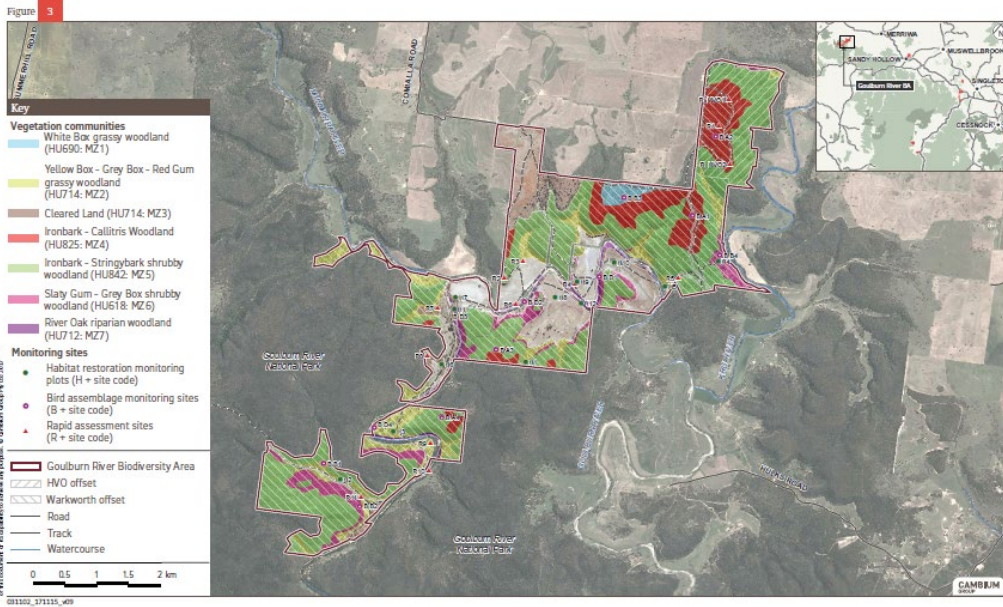

Management Plan 2017

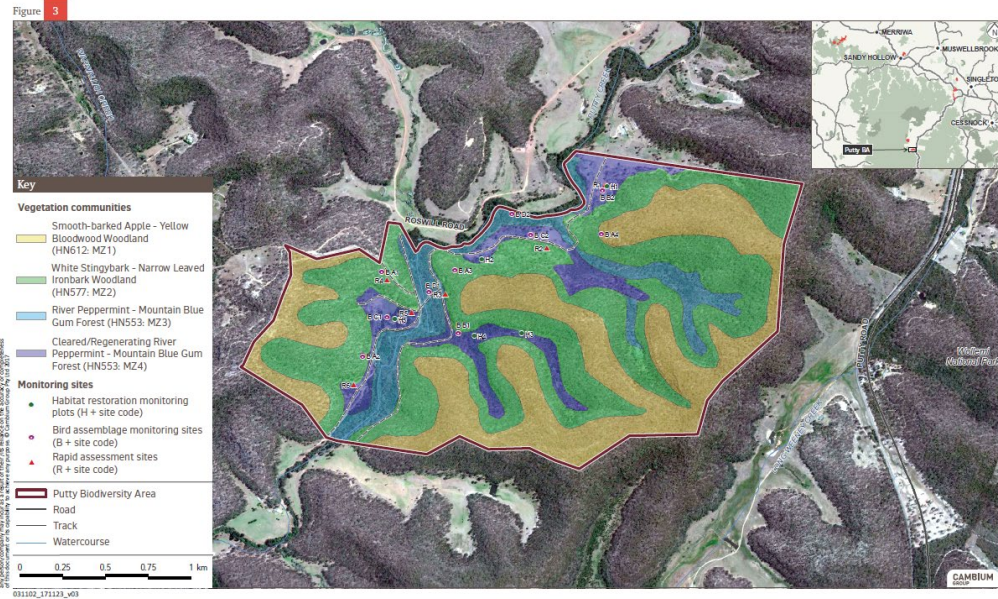


Goulburn River Biodiversity Area and bird monitoring locations

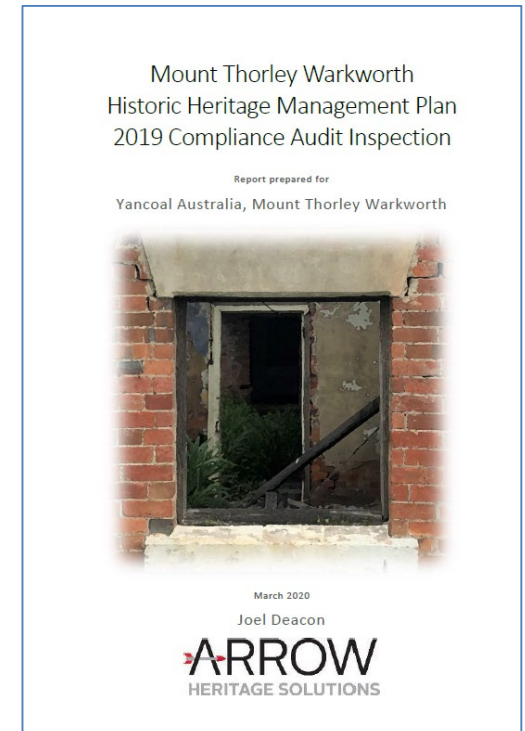
Vegetation communities, management zones and monitoring sites at the Putty Biodiversity Area

MTW Historic Heritage Management

Management Plans / Reporting

- On 1/05/20 the Annual EPBC Biodiversity Compliance Report (2002/629 and 2009/5081) was submitted to the DPIE and DoEE.
- The Annual Return for MTO Environment Protection Licence 1976 was submitted on 29/5/20.
- In June, DPIE accepted the MTW Annual Review for 2019. The Annual Review Report 2019 has now been published on the MTW website.
- An Independent Environmental Audit Report was submitted to DPIE on 17/07/20, along with MTW's response to the recommendations from the audit report. This is per the requirements in MTW's Development Consents (SDD-6464 and SDD-6465)
- A request for further information was received 24/07/20 from the Resource Regulator in relation the Mine Operations Plan (MOP) Amendment C, which was submitted 31/03/20. The requested information is required to be provided by 4/9/20.
- A number of Environmental Management Plans were revised and submitted to DPIE on 28/07/2020 as required after submission of the Annual Review report (Environmental Management Strategy, Air Quality Management Plan, Noise Management Plan, Blast Management Plan, Water Management Plan).

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General Business - Community update

Black Summer Bushfire Emergency – Yancoal Contribution

- Following the devastating bushfires last summer, Yancoal made a number of commitments to assist our local communities. In addition to the \$500,000 Yancoal contributed to the NSW Rural Fire Service, we also committed to match employee donations made in relation to the bushfires.
- Almost \$6,000 in individual donations were made by staff to a diverse range of organisations associated with fire-fighting efforts, environmental preservation and the provision of assistance to those adversely impacted. Yancoal has made donations of \$2,000 each to the RSPCA (NSW), Foodbank (NSW/ACT) and the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal, (\$6,000 total) to match donations made by staff.
